


ICE-BREAKERS

- Q. 1 When have you seen someone bring peace or hold things together in a difficult situation?
- Q. 2 How do people today try to make the ‘invisible’ visible?
- Q. 3 If someone asked you, “*What is God like?*” how would you answer?
- Q. 4 Paul talks about the “*mystery*” now revealed. What’s a truth about faith or life that took you a long time to understand?
- Q. 5 What does Paul’s description of Jesus in this passage tell us about what God values?

SERMON-BASED

- Q. 1 Why do you think it’s easier for us to describe injustice than to define what true justice looks like?
- Q. 2 In what ways do we try to make God more “*tangible*” or manageable, whether through images, expectations, or cultural assumptions?

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Sermon-Based Cont.

Q. 3 Have you ever felt a spiritual “*famine*” - a time when God felt silent or distant? What helped you recognize His presence again?

Q. 4 What does it mean to you to be a “*living image*” of the invisible God?

Q. 5 How can your daily life - your words, actions, and relationships - reveal Christ’s humility, justice, and love to others?

BEYOND THE TEXT

Q. 1 How does Jesus, as “*the image of the invisible God*,” reshape our understanding of who God is, and how does this connect to the biblical theme of God dwelling with His people from Genesis to Revelation?

Q. 2 In a world that prizes visible strength, wealth, and dominance, how does the cross of Christ challenge our assumptions about power and justice?

Q. 3 What does it mean to embody Christ in a culture that often trusts in idols - whether material, ideological, or visual - and how can believers resist spiritual famine by seeking the Word made flesh?

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
